Our new members' morning tea held in the Community Hall was attended by an equal number of tutors and new members. Tutors obliged by wearing not only a name badge but also a badge giving the title of their course and this helped many new members to make enquiries. Our wonderful Bob Thornhill (Digital Photography) who had recently returned from Lake Eyre kindly showed amazing aerial photos of the Lake and surrounding countryside – all on the most up to date digital equipment! – as you would expect. ### **From the Wednesday Walkers—Report on their Annual Trip Away**



The Wednesday Walking group spent the week 19th to 23rd October enjoying the hospitality of the Portland Claremont Holiday Park. 13 of the group arrived on Monday and commenced the weeks activities with a raucous happy hour plus an evening meal provided by group members. The aim of the week was to experience some of the challenging walks that constitute the Great South West Walk, a 20 plus day walk from Portland to Portland which takes in the Glenelg River, the township of Nelson and the beaches that abut the Southern Ocean.

On the Tuesday the group tackled the 15 km leg of the walk from Mt Richmond to Bridgewater Lakes. The first leg of this walk was downhill and relatively easy and the group was excited after spotting 2 koalas in the trees on the mountain. The second leg produced some anxious moments in that vandalism had caused the disappearance of some key track markers and doubt existed as to the correct track, but all turned out well and the cars that had been left there prior to the walk were reached mid afternoon.

Wednesday was designated a free day and whilst some took in the Cape Nelson Lighthouse and surrounds, the majority walked around the sights of Portland, took a ride on the Portland Tram and did some shopping. That night we were joined by two more of the Wednesday group and we all enjoyed an excellent BBQ cooked brilliantly by Ray and Tony.

Thursday was by far the best day as in beautiful weather we walked another 15 km on the coastal track that took in the spectacular coastline of Cape Bridgewater. Every turn introduced a new scenic view and we experienced such sights as the petrified forest, the freshwater springs on the rocks just above the coast, the fur seals surfing and diving on seal rocks, the huge waves spraying high above the rocks, the kangaroos grazing among the coastal vegetation and finally the large wind farm with its many turbines spread right across the cape.

Dinner that night was at Mac's Hotel, an old Victorian building which has retained its old world charm. The conversation on the evening, while enjoying an excellent quality meal, was of the week's experiences and the beauty of the walk we experienced that day.

All agreed that it was indeed a wonderful, wonderful week, brilliantly led by our organiser Tony Edwards, whose organisational and leadership abilities were again first class.

## TWENTIETH CENTURY AUSTRALIA An Interview with Richard Cotter.

Commencing February next year, historian Richard Cotter will run an Australian history course for U3A Southern Peninsula entitled *Australia in (much of) the 20th Century*. The course will be of ten week's duration with each week devoted to one decade. The first, 1900-09, will study the Constitution, immigration restriction (White Australia), while the last, 1990-99, will focus on Republicanism; Hawke, Keating and Howard, with the weeks in between covering issues and events as diverse as War, The Depression, Politics, 'The Stolen Generation', Women's Rights, Phar Lap and Bradman.

Many members will know that Richard's previous course for U3ASP, *The History of The Southern Peninsula*, has been so popular that he has had to repeat it 3-4 times a year for the last 4 years. He may well find himself running this new course for an equal number of years, but is quite prepared to do so, believing U3A to be a 'brilliant organisation.' When interviewed, he referred to 'the phenomenal achievement of running such an extensive range of courses and activities on an

entirely voluntary basis.'

Richard's career in education has been both in schools, and at University level, teaching Australian history, economics and accountancy. Since moving to the Mornington Peninsula ten years ago, he has concentrated on his writing, his classes for U3ASP and his work with The David Collins Settlement, Sorrento. He is currently President of the Friends Group for the Settlement.

Richard's writings include *No Place for a Colony* (about the David Collins Settlement), *History of Box Hill Grammar School*, *Boonwurrung*, and *A Short History of the Nepean Peninsula*. His various text books have all been well received but he takes particular pride in the *History of Box Hill Grammar School* where he taught when it was known as Kingwood College.

This new course will commence on Wed.3<sup>rd</sup> Feb. and then be held each Wed from 1.30 – 4.00 in the Old Shire Offices Dromana.
